Ice Breaker	Policy Council Representatives participated in an icebreaker group activity to open communication and build connections among members.
<ul> <li>Administrative Reports</li> <li>CSB Director</li> <li>Division Manager</li> <li>Fiscal</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Camilla Rand, Director, welcomed Policy Council representatives and presented program updates:</li> <li>Six Hundred (600) CSB and Partner children are transitioning to Kindergarten. As the children phase out during the summer, we will begin phasing new children into the program.</li> <li>CSB's number 1 priority is safety and parents are our partners in ensuring children's safety. The following safety reminders were shared as to ways parents can help us: 1) sign children in/out daily when dropping off and picking up, 2) avoid talking on the phone during drop off/pick up times so full attention can be given to the children, and 3) always hold your child's hand in the parking lot and when crossing streets in near the school.</li> <li>Updated marketing materials that we give to our legislators, board of directors and community members</li> </ul>

	<ul> <li>visiting our centers were shared with the group (parental consent was given for all children who were photographed). Last ones were about 10 years old and so revisions and updates were needed.</li> <li>CSB currently has a job opening for a food transporter. We transport approximately 40,000 meals to our centers every month and our transporters are responsible for delivering meals from our central kitchen to the centers. The group was asked to spread the word and encourage anyone they know who may be interested in becoming a transporter to apply for the position.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Katharine Mason, Division Manager, introduced herself and presented May enrollment and attendance statistics:</li> <li>Enrollment: 98.3% for Head Start; 103.21% for Early Head Start, 100% for Early Head Start Child Care Program Partnership #1; and 70.53% for Early Head Start Child Care Program Partnership #2.</li> <li>Attendance: 86.67% for Head Start; 78.08% for Early Head Start; 96.10% for Early Head Start Child Care Program Partnership #1; and 84.06% for Early Head Start Child Care Program Partnership #2.</li> </ul>
	Katharine also presented the following program highlights:
	<ul> <li>CSB in partnership with the Contra Costa County Library launched a Summer Reading Program Pilot at our Verde and Marsh Creek Centers. Children received books and signed up for library cards so they could visit the library to check out books and take advantage of the many programs the libraries offer.</li> <li>CSB provides professional development throughout the year during scheduled early closures for our teachers as well as for our comprehensive services staff. The annual Comprehensive Services refresher training is scheduled for 26<sup>th</sup>. Comprehensive Services staff provides support to families during the enrollment process; follows up on health screenings; conducts Family Partnership Agreements; and provides resources.</li> <li>June 29<sup>th</sup> is the last day for the 2017-18 program year and this is last day of school for the majority of our kindergarten bound children as well. It is always hard for teachers, parents and children to say goodbye.</li> <li>We will not have Policy Council meeting in July. July updates will be shared during our August meeting.</li> </ul>





	<ul> <li>3% of 0-5 year olds are uninsured, a decrease of 519 uninsured 0-5 year-old children from last year.</li> <li>Contra Costa County ranks 40<sup>th</sup> in the State with only 24% of low-income children visiting the dentist.</li> <li>20,880 students receive special education; of those 2,205 are children under 6 yrs. This went up by 3% from last year. The top two disabilities were Speech and Language impairment and Autism.</li> <li>Domestic violence calls continue to decrease.</li> <li>Substantiated Child Abuse decreased 3.2 per 1,000. However, the percentage involving infants in child abuse cases continues to trend up. Children under the age of 1 made up 18%. Foster care went up by 3.8 per 1,000.</li> </ul>

	• Transitional Kindergarten (TK) rose slightly to 2,531.
	• Childcare slots have a notable shift out in Hercules, Brentwood, San Pablo, and Richmond. We had notable shifts into Moraga, San Ramon, Walnut Creek, Concord, Rodeo, Pleasant Hill, and Byron.
	• 16,602 preschool centers and 1,905 infant centers. Even though this is a 1% increase, we want to emphasize that since 2014 there has been a decrease of childcare centers.
	• About 28% of childcare slots are available for children age 0-12 with working parents.
Reports: Annual Reports	Amy Wells, Assistant Director, provided an overview of the 2017 Annual Report on behalf of Nasim Eghlima, Administrative Services Assistant III.
	The Annual Report showcases the work we do in our community. It summarizes all of CSB's services and innovative and work that has been done in 2017. The following is a brief summary of the report; a hard copy of the full report will be provided at the next meeting and are available online. Key Highlights include the following:
	<ul> <li>CSB successfully secured a new Early Head Start grant to serve an additional 190 infant and toddlers.</li> <li>New partnerships include San Ramon, Baby Yale in Brentwood, Tiny Toes in Brentwood, and KinderCare in Antioch.</li> <li>Growing our own approach is supporting our own staff to move forward and advance in their professional development. We are doing this through our new Teacher Assistant Training Program (TAT) and our Teacher Apprenticeship program (TAP).</li> </ul>




## 2017 DRDP Infants
