Dr. Calvit holds a Doctorate of Education-Educational Leadership and Master of Public Administration from California State University, Stanislaus; a Master of Education from Grand Canyon University, Phoenix, Arizona; and a Bachelor of Public Administration from Jackson State University, Jackson, Mississippi.

# Stefany Martinez and AAS Swing Into Action

Swing Into Action
Expanding Community's Help
for Elderly Woman

Neighbors were banding together to help an 80-year old woman who was living at the end of the street in a ramshackle camper. Plastic tarps draped over the roof to keep the rain out, and pieces of plywood filled in the missing walls. Univision 14 (KDTV) reported on the senior woman's plight and how her neighbors were looking out for her, featuring her story on the station's website on February 22nd (https://www.univision.com/local/san-francisco-kdtv/maria-mexicana-vive-camper-pobreza-bay-point).

That same evening and again the next day, Aging and Adult Services Social Worker **Stefany Martinez** drove out to the scene in Bay Point where the elderly woman humbly accepted her offers of food and medical resources. Stefany examined the camper where the woman had been fighting off the cold with her small dog, her pet cockatiel, and her adult son who was out looking for work. The woman, who says she immigrated from Jalisco, Mexico, 15 years ago, had been

keeping warm under a pile of blankets. However, she was in need of a toilet and running water. "In a case like this, we will work with community partners," said Stefany. "We'll figure out how to keep her safe, warm and make sure she has all her basic needs like food, shelter and healthcare."

Meanwhile, a neighbor drove up to drop off food for the woman. No one in the neighborhood initially thought to call EHSD's Adult and Aging Services. "This is common," says Stefany. "I don't think many people are aware of the Adult Protective Services (APS) program and what services we have to offer. But this is what we're here to do."



APS is working to find permanent housing for the elderly woman and her dog.

Stefany offered that message to Univision 14 during a later interview with reporter Candy Duran. This case demonstrates what is at the heart of social work – supporting the County's most vulnerable residents.

The case also underscores the importance of a concerted effort to inform/remind our community members – even mandated reporters – that they can call our **Information and Assistance** line at **(800) 510-2020** if they need resources for a senior or disabled adult, and, if they suspect elder abuse, they can report it by calling **(877) 839-4347**.

# CFS Volunteers Step Up to Train Mandated Reporters

Announcing the renewed partnership and collaboration between Contra Costa County Child Abuse Prevention Council (CAPC) and Children & Family Services (CFS)!

In late 2020, **Cristina Hickey** (CAPC) and **Mari Solis** (CFS) joined efforts with two goals in mind: 1) develop a consistent and comprehensive mandated reporter training program for agency/community partners, and 2) recruit a group of dedicated CFS social worker volunteers to co-train with CAPC. The training would also aim to clear up common misconceptions about suspected child abuse reporting, and educate audiences about CFS's mandates of child safety, permanency & wellbeing.

With more than 16 years of knowledge and experience, Cristina helped set the vision for a new and improved CAPC Mandated Reporter Training (MRT) community-outreach training program, while Mari steered the process to get there. As a

result, two separate trainings emerged: <u>MRT 101</u>, the Basic Mandated Reporter Training, which now integrates some CFS information; and <u>MRT 102</u>, which clarifies "What You Need to Know" about CFS's role upon receiving a Suspected Child Abuse Report (SCAR).

Since September 2021, the CFS social worker volunteers have co-trained at 12 schools (including 784 mandated reporters). In 2022, more MRT 101 & 102 trainings will be held virtually or in person throughout Contra Costa County. If you are a CFS social worker interested in becoming a Mandated Reporter Training volunteer to co-train with CAPC, or you have an audience for either MRT 101 or 102, please contact Cristina Hickey at (925) 798-0546, ext. 15.

CDSS' Community Care Licensing Division (CCLD) Child Care Program oversees the health and safety of children in licensed childcare settings, and provides resources to educate and empower parents and the public about childcare. CCLD licenses approximately 44,000 family childcare homes and childcare centers throughout California.

person or organization you trust, but in reality they're sent by hackers to get you to click on or open something that will give the hackers access to your information.

### Why are you at risk?

As a result of escalating international tensions, local governments are increasingly at risk of phishing attacks. Hackers are actively targeting Contra Costa County because we have information that is valuable to them. Specifically, they may be interested in our citizen, employee, patient, and financial information. Hackers may also be interested in disrupting County operations.

## How to spot a phishing email

Hackers have gotten clever in how they design the emails they send out to make them look legitimate. But phishing emails often have the following characteristics:

- Ask you for sensitive information such as your username and password
- Look like they come from the HR or IT department
- · Contain email addresses that don't match between the header and the body, are misspelled (like @gmaill.com), or have unusual formats (@ company-othersite.com)
- · Have links or email addresses that show a different destination if you hover over them
- Try to create a sense of urgency about responding

## What you should do if you get a suspicious email

If you suspect that an email is a phishing email:

- Do not open any links or attachments in the email
- Trust your intuition
- Ask for assistance EHSD call (925) 521-7200
- Follow any relevant departmental guidance

By now, most people understand the benefits and risks of social media use. While staying connected and informed is quite convenient today, staying safe remains very important.

- Set your social media profiles to private to limit who can view your information.
- Before posting information or photos online, think twice about whether you'd be comfortable with anyone seeing that content—even if you believe the content will be protected by security settings.
- If someone harasses or threatens you online, remove them from your friends list, block them and report them to the site administrator.
- Don't post any personal data online, as this could enable others to use that information to steal your identity, access your data or commit other crimes such as stalking. Also, never reveal where you're vacationing, shopping or traveling.
- When accepting friends online, choose people who you already know and trust.
- Recognize that taking breaks from social media can be healthy.

# Harriet Tubman: A Woman of Courage and Vision

Equity and Inclusion Core Group collaboration based on online sources

Harriet Tubman was an American abolitionist and political activist who freed herself and led many others from the bonds of slavery. She faced many challenges throughout her life; nevertheless, she was determined to change the world with her courage and her constant fight for equity and inclusion.

To honor her, **EHSD's Equity and Inclusion Core Group** joins the nation in celebrating Harriet Tubman Day on March 10<sup>th</sup>, remembering the great work she did for our country during her lifetime.

Born into slavery, Harriet escaped and subsequently made some 13 missions to rescue approximately 70 enslaved people, including family and friends, using the network of antislavery activists and safe houses known as the Underground Railroad.


Harriet grew up on Maryland's Eastern Shore, where the lines between slavery and freedom were often blurred. It was not unusual for families in this area to include both free and enslaved members. Harriet would remain enslaved until she fled to Pennsylvania in 1849.

In Philadelphia, Harriet joined the Abolitionist Movement and became a conductor on the Underground Railroad, earning her the nickname of "Moses" after the prophet in The Bible who led his people to freedom. In all her journeys, Harriet never lost a passenger.

Harriet's early years in slavery, her escape to freedom and her time as a conductor on the Underground Railroad demonstrate how she was a woman of true courage and vision.

The Underground Railroad was a lifeline for slaves escaping to freedom, and Harriet Tubman was






After the Civil War, Tubman continued the struggle for freedom as a leader in the suffrage movement. She died from pneumonia on March 10, 1913 in Auburn, New York, and was buried with military honors.



# Cesar Chavez Day

Contra Costa County will celebrate Cesar Chavez on Tuesday, March 29th, at 11 a.m. during the Board of Supervisors meeting, commemorating the legacy of the American labor leader and civil rights activist.

Chavez launched the farmworker movement 60 years ago on his 35th birthday, March 31st. On that date, he and Dolores Huerta co-founded the National Farm Workers Association, which later became the United Farm Workers of America.



a moral cause, gained wide support.

Cesar Chavez died in 1993. His motto "Si se puede!" ("Yes, it can be done!") embodies the uncommon legacy he left for people around the world. Cesar Chavez stood for equality, justice and dignity for all Americans. His universal principles remain as relevant and inspiring today as they were when he first began his movement.

Chavez was born in Yuma, Arizona, and his family lost their small farm near there during the Great Depression. They became migrant farmworkers and Chavez finished his formal education after eighth grade to labor in the fields, orchards and vineyards to help support his family. He experienced the hardships and injustices of farm worker life. He later served in the U.S. Navy in the aftermath of World War II.

Chavez began his career in community organizing in 1952 in the Sal Si Puedes (leave if you can) area in East San Jose. He spent 10 years coordinating voter registration drives and organizing Community Service Organization chapters there and across California. He then followed his dream to organize a union that would protect and serve the farm workers whose poverty and powerlessness he had shared. His years of leading the struggle for better rights for farm workers, using aggressive but nonviolent tactics for
