Administrative Reports • Interim Division Manager	<ul> <li>Amy Wells, Interim Division Manager, provided enrollment and attendance statistics for the month of January as follows:         <ul> <li>The February enrollment was 69.20% for Head Start, 84.29% for Early Head Start and Early Head Start Child Care Partnership #2.</li> <li>The February attendance was 72.28% for Head Start, 70.85% for Early Head Start and Early Head Start Child Care Partnership #2.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Program updates:         <ul> <li>Classroom Operations-</li> <li>Staff and children 2 years of age and up must wear a mask while on site even with the mask mandate lifted. This practice remains per Head Start Program Performance Standards HSPPS.</li> <li>Vaccination is required to volunteer at the centers. Administrative Reports • Fiscal	<ul> <li>Juan Batiz, Policy Council Co-Chair, presented the following financial reports with support from Haydee Ilan, Accountant III:</li> <li>2020-2021 Head Start Program: January 2022, year-to-date cash expenditures were \$651,829 YTD, representing 4% of the program budget.</li> <li>2020-2021 Early Head Start Program and CC Partnership: January 2022, year-to-date cash expenditures were \$80,407 YTD, representing 1% of the program budget.</li> <li>Credit Card expenditures for all programs, including Head Start and Early Head Start, for January 2022, were \$19,602.97.</li> <li>Child and Adult Care Food Program: January 2022, total meals served, including breakfast, lunch, and supplements, were 13,179.</li> </ul>

Wellness Activity	Policy Council Representatives participated in a wellness activity by sharing "Spring Family Activities".
Report: Oral Health	<ul> <li>Catherine Lucero, Comprehensive Services Manager for Heath, presented "Teeth for Tots" to help understand the importance of good oral hygiene for children and adults.</li> <li>Reducing the Risk of Tooth Decay-Prevent spreading cavity-causing germs by avoiding some common practices: Tasting the baby's food before offering the spoon to the child, sharing utensils such as a spoon or a cup, or cleaning off a pacifier or baby bottle nipple with the mouth. Reminder: when caregivers have clean and healthy mouths they are less likely to transmit cavity-causing bacteria. Put the baby to sleep by rocking, singing, and cuddling as a soothing technique instead of a bottle. When a baby sleeps with a bottle, the liquid pools in the mouth and around teeth. The sugar in milk, formula and juice can create acid in the mouth. Acid begins to eat away the child's thin tooth enamel, causing tooth decay.</li> <li>Dental Visits- Every 6 months</li> <li>Fluoridated Toothpaste -Fluoride is a mineral found naturally in water, soil, and air. Almost all water contains some fluoride, but fluoride levels can vary depending on where your water comes from. In addition, fluoride is added to many public water supplies in America. The amount added varies by area, and not all areas add fluoride. It's also added to toothpaste and water supplies because fluoride can help:</li> </ul>

	prevent cavities, strengthen weakened tooth enamel, reverse early tooth decay, limit the growth of oral bacteria, and slow the loss of					
	minerals from tooth enamel.					
	<ul> <li>Is Fluoride Toothpaste Safe for Babies and Toddlers? Good oral health is important from the start. Before a baby's teeth come in</li> </ul>					
	can help to remove bacteria by wiping their mouth with a soft cloth. As soon as their teeth start to come in, the American Academy					
	Pediatrics recommends switching to a toothbrush and fluoride toothpaste. But babies only need a very small smear of toothpaste-no					
	more than the size of a grain of rice. These guidelines are an update to former recommendations, which had suggested using fluoride-free					
	toothpaste until children reach the age of 2. To minimize the risk of swallowing, try angling your baby's head slightly downward so that					
	any extra toothpaste dribbles out their mouth. It is okay, if your baby or toddler does swallow some of this small amount of toothpaste.					
	As long as you are using the recommended amount of toothpaste, swallowing a little bit should not cause any problems.					
	• Adult Oral Health Like other areas of the body, your mouth teams with bacteria-mostly harmless bacteria. But your mouth is the entry					
	point to your digestive and respiratory tracts, and some of these bacteria can cause disease. Normally the body's natural defenses and					
	good oral health care, such as daily brushing and flossing, keep bacteria under control. However, without proper oral hygiene, bacteria					
	can reach levels that might lead to oral infections, such as tooth decay and gum disease. Also, certain medications - such as					
	decongestants, antihistamines, painkillers, diuretics and antidepressants - can reduce saliva flow. Saliva washes away food and neutralizes					
	acids produced by bacteria in the mouth, helping to protect you from microbes that multiply and lead to disease. Practice good oral					
	hygiene by: daily brushing your teeth with a soft-bristled brush, use fluoride toothpaste, flossing daily, using mouthwash to remove food					
	particles left after brushing, eating and flossing. Eat a healthy diet and limit food with added sugars, replacing your toothbrush every					
	three months or if bristles are spayed or worn, lastly, scheduling regular dental checkups and cleanings.
