# **Serving Our Veterans at Stand Down on the Delta 2023**

*"Veterans served their country; Veterans serve their community"* was the theme for this year's

Stand Down at the Delta. at the Contra Costa County Fairgrounds in Antioch from September 8<sup>th</sup> through 11<sup>th</sup>. Stand Down on the Delta is a fourday event to support the people who have given to our country as members

of the U.S. military. While many unhoused Veterans ride buses in for the event, this year it was open to the public for one day on Saturday, September 9<sup>th</sup>. **Juarez** from Workforce Services were on hand at Stand Down to help Veterans get information and apply to our various benefit programs.

Many organizations, including White Pony Express, Shelter Inc., NAMI, EDD, Pride Industries, Salvation Army, Swords to Plowshares, Insight Housing, East Bay Regional Parks, and the Department of Labor, the Lions Club and Rotary Club also offered support and resources to our Vets.

According to Delta Veterans Group, the event organizer, the Stand Down on the Delta biennial event has helped more than 1,454 Veterans and their families, served more than 23,000 meals, given away 1100 pairs of boots,1,500 sleeping bags, 1,300 pairs of new jeans, \$500,000 in Dental Care. It has also helped take more than 200 veterans fishing on our Delta shores and many more find permanent housing.

# EHSD Director Answers Questions about EBT Card Disbursements on Fox 2 News

EHSD Director **Marla Stuart** appeared on KTVU Fox News at Noon during a live in-studio segment about Pandemic EBT (Electronic Benefits Transfer) 4.0 benefits. During the interview, on September 21<sup>st</sup>, Marla provided basic information about the EBT cards some families were receiving in the mail through the end of September.

P-EBT 4.0 is the final round of the federally funded program run by the California Department of Social Services (CDSS) and CA Department of Education (CDE). Eligibility is based on several factors, including participation in the National School Lunch Program for school-aged children, and CalFresh participation for younger children under 6 years during the 2022-23 school year. Marla emphasized the importance of food resources for families and using the P-EBT card for healthy food. She explained that the extra food support was put in place during Covid to help kids who may not have had adequate access to food when not at school.

# DocuSign Single Sign-On Notification

DocuSign has implemented a new security login feature allowing users to log into the system using their Apple/Windows County login. This is a small part of how we work to secure our County systems better and simplify life, so you do not have to remember and manage many separate passwords.

Once implemented, you will see two options on login:

#### Use company login

Use Other Login Options

All EHSD staff members can use the "use company login" to log directly into the system. Note that if you are already logged into a County computer, you will go straight into DocuSign.

If your login fails, you may use the "Use Other Login Options" to continue working. However, please email ehsd\_helpdesk@ehsd.cccounty. us with subject "DocuSign: login issue for [Your name]".

DoIT will send out a notice directly to all staff after the changes are implemented.

# Secrets of the Dead The Uncanny Responsibilities of the Public Administrations Media Specialist

Photo albums can help track down family members. **Kylie Frost** says they go through every corner of a deceased person's house looking for clues that could lead them to a family member.

The Contra Costa County Public Administrator's Office (PAO) is a mundane government name given to a team of EHSD investigators who, at times, don full hazmat gear and enter homes of their deceased clients in search of clues from an interesting past.

Those clues help the team track down family members who can provide vital information. Documents discovered during a search as well as forwarded mail help the team identify assets belonging to the deceased which are often liquidated so bills can be paid, and the balance of the estate distributed to the rightful people. In some cases, county residents die penniless (some while living on the streets). When no next of kin can be located, their remains are cremated and the urn is placed in what's called a 'community niche' with other unclaimed urns.

The Coroner's office refers some of the cases to us," says Deputy Public Administrator, Jaimie Scroggins. "We use online tools such as <u>Ancestry.com</u> and <u>Newspapers.com</u> to find possible relatives."

Aside from online searches, they enter the deceased person's home looking for address books, letters, anything that can lead to the person's next of kin. "Christmas cards are a big help," says Public

Administrator's Program Assistant, Kylie Frost. "I've found Christmas cards from the 80's that led us to family members,"

Kylie started out as a Beginning Level Clerk with a CalWORKS field unit in 2012. It's a far cry from her current job that requires her, at times, to enter the homes of people who died alone only to be discovered days or weeks later. These homes are in various degrees of disorder and cleanliness, often with hoarded items. During a search, staff may be exposed to unpleasant odors and the bugs associated with decomposition. "So we wear full personal protective equipment including air filter masks," says Kylie. "We even have head lamps in case the power has been turned off and we're working in the dark."

For a person who says "bugs creep me out," Kylie has embraced the challenges that come with the excitement of solving mysteries while uncovering the interesting backgrounds of the deceased. Homes may have other pests such as roaches or rodents and the droppings they leave behind. "I've seen it all and it doesn't faze me anymore," she says.

Aside from sleuthing, navigating the world of county records and enduring unpleasant environments, the PAO investigators have to be quick studies in the world of antiquities. "We've had deceased residents who left behind collections of guitars and clocks that had to be appraised and sold to pay off debts. Often times, we don't have any idea how much they're worth, so we have to research their value online," says Kylie. "I actually learned a few things by watching the Antiques Roadshow on PBS," she laughs. They also call in the help of experts who appraise jewelry and other unique items.

The PAO recently migrated from Contra Costa Health to EHSD where it's part of the Aging and Adult Services bureau. "We spent a lot of time preparing for the transition and it went smoothly because of the effort of everyone involved," says Chief Deputy Public Administrator, Amy Elstermeyer.

With an active caseload of about one hundred cases, the Public Administrator's office is expanding its three-person team with a soon-tobe announced Public Administrator's Program Assistant position. Amy says interested individuals can submit a job interest card by clicking this link Jobs | Contra Costa County, CA Official Website. # Hispanic Heritage Month

## Did you know?

Hispanic Heritage Month was first commemorated as a week in 1968 by Lyndon B. Johnson and later Ronald Reagan turned it into a monthlong commemoration. It celebrates the rich diversity, culture and contributions of the Hispanic/Latino population in the U.S.

The start date coincides with the Declaration of Independence of several Latin American countries from Spain, September 15th–18th: September 15 – Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua September 16 – Mexico September 18 – Chile

## What's in a label?

*Hispanic* – Used to identify people from Spain and other Spanish speaking countries. First used in the 1980 Census to group together people from Spain, Central & South America living in the U.S.

*Chicano/a* – Used by people born in the U.S. of Mexican descent who identify with their indigenous ancestry. Gained popularity during the 1960s & 70s in the fight for civil rights & social justice.

**Latino/a** – An alternative to Hispanic used by those that identify with their family's country of origin in Latin America, including non-Spanish speaking countries like Brazil.

*LatinX* – A gender-neutral alternative to Latino or Latina. The term has gained popularity in recent years.
