Contra Costa County helped raise a whopping \$55,648.24, which breaks down to about \$5.74 per employee. That's a very honorable showing and means our County is the winner of the World Peas award.

Winners in all categories are based on the amount raised per employee. EHSD came in third in Contra Costa County's large department (300+ employees) category and raised a total of \$3,813.89 or \$2.09 per employee. You can see the large department standings below. Juggling Case Loads, Mental Health Needs and a Baby Boomer Surge

Ana Echezarreta is a Social Worker for Aging and Adult Services, In-Home Support Services (IHSS) Unit at 4545 Delta Fair, in Antioch. She has worked 10 years, 6 months with Medical and Calfresh programs, 8 years with IHSS in the Richmond office and the past 2 years in the IHSS Antioch Office.

The demand for social workers is reflected in the statistics – the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) estimates the field will grow exponentially. There will be more than 782,000 social workers in the United States by 2030, according to BLS. "Overall employment of social workers is projected to grow 7 percent from 2022 to 2032, faster than the average for all occupations," the BLS states on its website.

That growth will come with an increasing need for services. **Sequoia Stanley** is a Social Worker II for the Children and Family Services, Emergency Response Unit who says the demand for mental health assistance for foster children is creating more of a challenge in serving them. "Honestly, we're really not equipped for it, but we're getting there. We're learning and partnering with different organizations," she says.

Sharee McKey is a Social Worker for Workforce Services, Assessment/Intensive Services (AIS) Unit who agrees the demand for mental health assistance is on the rise. "Now the stigma of mental health services is not there, and people are wanting these services and sometimes not all of the services are there for the people in the community," she says. Homelessness is the other big issue Sharee is dealing with while trying to help her clients obtain an education and jobs.

Meanwhile, there is a surge of Baby Boomers who have retired.

According to Pew Research, about 28.6 million Baby Boomers are out of the labor force and many of them need In-Home Support Services. Ana Echezarreta is a Social Worker for Aging and

Adult's In-Home Support Services (IHSS) who says, "There are just so many and it's just so hard to get to everybody in a timely manner."

This month, the National Association of Social Workers, the country's largest social work association, is raising awareness of the social work profession and highlighting the need for the government, regulators, and employers to work to improve pay for social workers as a way of investing in addressing challenging social issues.
