# New Tech for EBT Cards Means Improved Security

Swapping out the old for new EBT printers was a big job for EHSD IT's Applications Team during February. Along with Workforce Services and EHSD's Clerical staff, they handled preparations for the EBT Card transition. Working late into the night on February 21st, they ensured a smooth "golive" process, facilitating the technology upgrade for food and cash benefit EBT cards.

"During the EBT cutover activities, various teams worked tirelessly to ensure a seamless and successful migration," explained Veronica Underwood,

Senior Systems Analyst. "The cutover involved replacing county administrative



equipment and installing new systems to support the transition. Rigorous testing was conducted to prevent disruptions and ensure all processes functioned smoothly, ultimately contributing to the project's success."

Veronica also noted that the preparation prior to the cutover weekend, including the dissemination of information and the coordination of resources, played a critical role in the overall success of the project.

The California Department of Social Services (CDSS) is replacing EBT cards to increase protection for EBT cardholders and reduce theft of benefits. The skimming of EBT cards has been a

arowina problem across the country over the past few years. with thousands of dollars stolen from those who receive food and cash benefits. Most EBT

cardholders were able to receive reimbursement, but the theft caused undue financial hardship for many.

California is the first state to launch new EBT cards with chip/tap technology, to help provide more secure transactions:

- Chip More sophisticated authentication process
- Tap Contactless technology, transmits data with just a tap of the card
- Magnetic Stripe New technology is embedded in the stripe
- Card Security Code (3-digit number) Allows card use for online purchases
- **SUID** County code and case number displays under the cardholder's name

# IT Helpdesk Has New Self-Service Portal



# Mandated Reporter Training: Valuable CAPC and CFS Partnership

The partnership between the Child Abuse Prevention Council (CAPC) and Children & Family Services (CFS) remains a crucial collaboration, particularly in mandated reporter training.

Mandated reporters, including teachers, healthcare workers, law enforcement, probation officers, mental health professionals, and social service providers are legally required to report suspected child abuse or neglect. All EHSD employees are mandated reporters and are required to receive the annual Mandated Reporter training online via SMART.

As the first line of defense in preventing and addressing child maltreatment, their role is critical.

Through this collaboration, CAPC and CFS ensure that mandated reporters not only meet legal requirements but are also equipped with the knowledge and confidence to make informed decisions that safeguard the well-being of children and youth in our communities.

# Teen Dating Violence Awareness and Prevention Month



The Board of Supervisors proclaimed the month of February 2025 as Teen Dating Violence Awareness and Prevention Month.

So, what is Teen Dating Violence exactly, and how does it impact our community?

Teen dating violence is a serious public health issue defined as physical, psychological, or sexual abuse; harassment; or stalking of any person ages 12 to 18 in a past or present romantic or consensual relationship.

Survivors of teen dating violence have an increased risk for truancy, dropout, teen pregnancy, suicide, having eating disorders, and engaging in other harmful behaviors such as use of alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs.

The Contra Costa Alliance to End Abuse, and STAND! For Families Free of Violence, work together to educate Contra Costa's youth, school staff, parents and service providers about teen dating violence and encourage the community to participate in activities that raise awareness and empower teens. # Personal Experience Fuels Justin Melvin's Advocacy

Justin Melvin with his mother who he says suffered from mental illness and was imprisoned when he was 16 years old.

With his relaxed demeanor and effortlessly cool style, **Justin Melvin** embodies the ideal social worker for young adults navigating the transition from foster care to independence. As part of the Transition Age Support Services Unit (TASSU) within Children and Family Services (CFS), Justin supports 18- to 21-year-old former foster youth receiving assistance through California Assembly Bill 12 (AB 12), also known as the California Fostering Connections to Success Act.

AB 12 aims to provide critical resources—including housing assistance, case management, and access to education and employment—to help young adults establish stability. While it offers a structured path forward, the journey isn't always easy.

"A high percentage of foster youth experience trauma, PTSD, depression, or anxiety that prevent them from making a successful transition to adulthood—things they may or may not want to work through," Justin explains.

What makes Justin especially effective in his role is his personal connection to the struggles his clients face.

"When I was 16 years old, my mother committed a nonviolent crime in which she damaged property. Despite having a documented mental health history, she did not receive mental health treatment, nor was she given the opportunity to participate in a mental health diversion program," says Justin.

"Instead, she was given 22 years in prison. That was the hardest thing about my childhood. But it really made me want to do what I do," he shares. "Sometimes these youth are perceived negatively based on how court reports are written. This has helped me be empathetic and compassionate while staying curious about the individuals I serve."

Among his many tattoos, one holds deep personal significance: an endless doorway with his mother's name at the top. "It represents her battle with mental illness—the feeling that there's no light at the end of the tunnel during times of struggle," he says.

Beyond advocating for better mental health support, Justin approaches his work with humility and a willingness to learn. "I try to be as open as possible because if you ever think you know everything about this job, it's time to hang it up. There's just so much to learn."

Justin's ability to connect with young adults on a personal level makes him more than just a caseworker—he's a mentor, a guide, and, for many, the first stable support system they've ever had. Whether he's helping a client secure housing, navigate the complexities of higher education, or simply lending an empathetic ear, Justin remains steadfast in his mission: to empower former foster youth with the tools and confidence they need to build the future they deserve.

Nicole brings professionalism combined with a great sense of humor -- a true asset to the team!


