EHSD Director Testifies on CSBG's Vital Role

On Tuesday, August 19th, EHSD Director **Dr. Marla Stuart** traveled to Sacramento to testify before the California Senate and Assembly Human Services Committees at the bi-annual hearing on the 2026–27 Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) State Plan. The purpose of the hearing was to evaluate the effectiveness of CSBG-funded programs across the state, which provide crucial support to individuals and families who are not fully served by other safety-net programs.

Dr. Stuart participated as part of the second of two panels, alongside three nonprofit agency representatives. In her testimony, she underscored the importance of CSBG as "the safety net for the safety net," explaining that the program fills critical gaps for community members who, due to immigration status or income levels just above federal poverty thresholds, are ineligible for traditional services such as CalFresh or Medi-Cal.

Contra Costa County leverages nearly \$1 million in CSBG funding (\$945,470) to address three community-identified priorities:

- Affordable housing and emergency shelter: Partnerships with Bay Area Legal Aid, Greater Richmond Interfaith Project (GRIP), Hope Solutions, and STAND! For Families Free of Violence prevented 3,590 utility shutoffs and helped 141 people experiencing homelessness secure safe housing.
- Food insecurity: Collaborations with Loaves and Fishes and Monument Crisis Center provided 3,378 meals and distributed 9,189 boxes of groceries.
- Underemployment and living wage jobs: Partner organizations, including Opportunity Junction, Monument Impact, and Rising Sun Center for Opportunity, removed barriers to employment and provided training, helping 120 adults obtain jobs at or above a living wage.

Dr. Marla Stuart warned legislators that proposed federal policy changes, including HR 1 and the President's budget proposal, could significantly reduce or eliminate major safetynet programs such as CalFresh, Medi-Cal, and CSBG. With 41% of Contra Costa households relying on safety-net assistance in 2024, she stressed that cuts would leave thousands without essential resources.

EHSD Director Testifies on CSBG's Vital Role

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Dr. Stuart closed her testimony by acknowledging the nonprofit partners whose voices amplify the urgency of maintaining CSBG funding.

Representatives from Loaves and Fishes, STAND!, and Opportunity Junction spoke about the devastating impact that funding reductions would have on their ability to feed families, shelter survivors of violence, and connect workers to living-wage jobs.



The program continued with a multilingual "Welcome," remarks from Supervisor Otto Lee and SSA dignitaries, and a soulful performance by Mr. Leo Rhythm and Soul Band.

Cultural presentations included **El Grito Folklorico**, APIEC dancer Thu Phoung, and the **NAEC Ohiya Cultural Enrichment Pow Wow Singers and Dancers**.

For the first time in Diversity Day's 12-year history, the event featured an LGBTQ+ performer, Kendoll, and comedians Avery Harmon and Terry Dorsey, adding a fresh and joyful dimension to the celebration.



Fall Prevention Awareness Week (FPAW), observed September 22–26th, shines a spotlight on strategies to help older adults stay safe, active, and independent. The campaign raises awareness about reducing fall risks and empowers seniors to live confidently without the fear of falling.

Through the Older Americans Act (OAA) and Measure X, the Area Agency on Aging funds Meals on Wheels Diablo Region (MOWDR) to provide caregiver support and fall-prevention services. These include the Dignity at Home program, which offers home modifications and assistive devices for adults 60 and older, as well as for caregivers supporting them.

Because staying active is key to fall prevention, MOWDR also offers evidence-based exercise programs such as A Matter of Balance and On the Move. A Matter of Balance helps participants manage concerns about falling, reduce risks at home, and improve strength and flexibility. On the Move focuses on biomechanics and walking control to build confidence and mobility.

Caregivers and older adults who may qualify are encouraged to explore these programs. A Matter of Balance classes begin September 2nd at the Lafayette Community Center and September 8th at the El Cerrito Community Center. Oneika Tinsley Reflects with Gratitude

Sometimes the best reminder of your impact comes from the voice of a client who has truly felt the warmth and generosity behind your everyday work.

For Oneika (Ah-neh-kah) Tinsley, that moment came when she turned to EHSD during a difficult chapter in her life. After losing her job at the California Department of Motor Vehicles, she found herself caring full-time for her grandmother with Alzheimer's. When her unemployment benefits ran out, Oneika applied for public assistance. She braced for judgment and indifference, but instead she was met with compassion.

Her first social worker took the time to listen and provide thoughtful support, not knowing she had only \$7 left in her bank account. That same sense of care continued with her next two workers, Adriana Martinez of CalWORKs and Jilliana Davis of Welfare to Work, who encouraged her and helped restore her confidence. Oneika recalls how each one "bent over backwards" to make sure she felt respected and seen.

66 I never felt like just another case. Each person went out of their way to help me move forward."

Through a quick referral, she was connected with Rene Tucker, an Employment Placement Counselor (EPC) for the Contra Costa WORKS (CCWORKS) program at the Workforce Development Board (WDB), which offers subsidized on-the-job training to build valuable skills and prepare participants for permanent employment. Oneika participated in

computer and Excel training, and today she is gaining real-world experience working as a clerk in EHSD's Staff Development office at 2600 Stanwell Dr. in Concord.

Reflecting on her journey,
Oneika says she never felt like
"just another case." Instead, three
different workers—who didn't even
know one another—treated her
with dignity and encouraged her
to take a leap of faith towards a
brighter future.

"They made me feel empowered," she explains. "The way they instilled confidence in me has been an amazing experience."

Contra Costa Health (CCH) is bringing health care directly to college campuses with the launch of new mobile health clinics serving students at Contra Costa College, Diablo Valley College, and Los Medanos College.

Starting this week, the clinics will visit each campus on a weekly basis, providing free school and sports physicals, confidential reproductive health services, and testing and treatment for sexually transmitted infections. The program expands on the successful high school mobile clinic model already in place across the county.

"College is a time of transition and learning. With classwork, jobs, and daily demands, health can fall lower on the list," said Dr. Grant Colfax, CCH Director. "By bringing care to campus, we are removing barriers and giving students an easy way to focus on their health."

Students under 21 can access reproductive health services regardless of insurance status. Physical exams are available for those who have Medi-Cal, Contra Costa Health Plan (CCHP), or are uninsured. The same services are also available to uninsured students or those with Medi-Cal/CCHP who are age 21 and older.

The Contra Costa Community College District (4CD) is partnering with CCH to bring these services to students. "We encourage our students to prioritize their physical and mental health, and this is just one example of how our colleges empower students to care for their well-being," said Chancellor Mojdeh Mehdizadeh.

Each mobile clinic is staffed with a nurse practitioner, registered nurse, health education specialist, and mobile clinic operator—

ensuring students receive comprehensive, professional care on-site.

CCH leaders emphasize that this expansion supports students during a critical time of growth and independence. By meeting students where they are—in their own learning environments—the mobile health initiative reinforces the County's commitment to accessible, equitable, and preventive health care.
