# 2025 Combined Charities Campaign Kicks Off

Contra Costa County's annual Combined Charities Campaign exemplifies our shared commitment to giving back to the community. This year, with many of our residents facing increased hardships due to funding cuts at the federal level, it's especially important we come together to help our most vulnerable community members.

The County's goal is to raise \$100,000 and have 100% participation for all departments. Employee donations help support health, wellness, research to cure diseases, food for families, plus efforts to reduce homelessness, protect the environment, save wildlife and much more.

County employee donations are welcome from Wednesday, October 1<sup>st</sup> through Friday, October 31, 2025.

EHSD staff is known for always making a difference within our communities and, in particular, being a campaign leader. EHSD broke its own record last year by raising \$24,132 during the 2024 Combined Charities Campaign. Not only was this the highest contribution of any department, but it also surpassed the previous year's total by nearly \$4,600.

Combined Charities is a **100% online giving** campaign. You can donate one of two ways:

- Pledge 12 equal Payroll deductions with after-tax dollars beginning January 10, 2026.
- 2. One-time online donation (credit or debit card)

You can pledge \$5, \$10, \$25, \$50 or more per month and split your giving between one or more of your favorite charities. No pledge is too small.

Donations are made with payroll after-tax dollars or one-time credit card or debit card payments. Charitable donations can be used for personal tax purposes.



# **CFS Hosts Motivational Interviewing** (MI) Training for Trainers

Children & Family Services (CFS) and Juvenile Probation recently co-hosted a comprehensive 3-day Motivational Interviewing (MI) Training for Trainers (T4T), coordinated by Ana Kaye, CFS Social Services Program Analyst, Mari Solis, CFS Staff Development Specialist, and Marina Kesseleva-Cercone, of probation. The T4T was the culmination of the County's **Comprehensive** Prevention Plan's initial effort to enhance service delivery by infusing MI in community and family strengthening services. This effort also included two 4-day MI Trainings, attended by cross sector providers, including EHSD, Child Welfare, Juvenile Probation, Behavioral Health, Health Services, Contra Costa County Office of Education, and multiple community and faith-based organizations. Trainings were led by Teresa Chandler of Great Lakes Training, Inc.

Over the course of the training, participants engaged in an intensive learning experience designed to deepen their understanding of MI principles and practices. Attendees presented assigned modules, showcasing their understanding through exercises and video analysis. Upon completion, participants earned official MI Trainer Certification from Great Lakes Training, Inc.

By encouraging client-driven dialogue, it promotes respectful, inclusive behavior change, making it a vital tool for EHSD staff supporting clients toward self-sufficiency.

Celebrating All Ages, a multi-faceted campaign.


The goal is to counter myths about getting older by addressing stereotypes, encouraging intergenerational connections, and recognizing the value and contributions people of all ages make in our community.





### S.H.A.R.E Community & Loaves & Fishes

Over the past month, I've had the privilege of attending the Tuesday morning gatherings hosted by S.H.A.R.E Community and Loaves & Fishes. What's offered goes far beyond basic resources — there's hot breakfast, fresh coffee, access to showers, hygiene products, clothing, and even occasional haircuts. But what truly stands out is the unwavering sense of dignity extended to every person who walks through the door. Staff members greet guests by name, offer genuine warmth, and create a space where everyone feels seen, welcomed. and valued.

There's a vibrant sense of community among the guests themselves – playing cornhole, chatting, and supporting one another like old friends. They've made me feel like part of that community, too, whether through a simple "good morning" or a quick, meaningful conversation.

During these mornings, I've had the opportunity to assist individuals with applying for benefits like General Assistance (GA), CalFresh (CF), and Medi-Cal (MC). I've also helped with checking case statuses, replacing lost cards, submitting reports, and more. After breakfast, many transition inside to Loaves & Fishes, where the dining room fills again — this time with shared meals and deeper conversations. The manager knows guests by name and makes sure no one feels like a stranger.

Each Tuesday leaves me with a deep sense of gratitude. The individuals I meet are often facing significant challenges, yet they show immense appreciation for the support offered. Their resilience is a powerful reminder of the importance of showing up consistently and meeting people where they are — with respect, compassion, and a willingness to listen.
